Plasticine Sculptures

Moulding prior knowledge and new learning in a range of divergent outcomes

Time: 10 minutes

Resources/Preparation:

 Enough plasticine for each student to have a roughly tangerine sized lump.

Introduction:

 Ask the students to pick up their plasticine and begin to warm it up by rolling it in their hands. Explain that you are going to call out a number of shapes that you would like them to mould.

Application:

- Begin by asking them to mould a few simple things to get them used to handling the plasticine.
- You could start with a sphere and move on to a cube, then a cylinder and then their first initial.
- Each time they have only 30 seconds to complete their model.
- Now tell them that they have two minutes to make a model of their choice, based around the content of the lesson, or scheme of work.
- You can be as specific or as broad as you like with your brief.
 For example, you could ask them to model something that they feel represents France.
- Or, had you been looking at well-known French landmarks you could request that they model one of their choice.
 Crucially at this stage you are asking them to decide for themselves exactly what they will model.
- It is also important to put the time limit on this activity. Given too much time the students may censor their choices.

Extensions:

- When introducing a new topic ask students to make a model that represents something they would like to find out about.
- When they are complete the students can share what they have modelled with a partner before introducing each other's work to the rest of the class.
- Make a gallery of these models and refer back to them at the end of the topic to see how many of the areas of interest were covered.
